Exploitation and Modern Slavery Pathway for Adults (with or without care and support needs)

This identifies the specific pathway when Exploitation, Modern Slavery and Trafficking concerns are raised. The term Modern Slavery encompasses human trafficking, slavery, domestic servitude and forced or compulsory labour and is defined within the Modern Slavery Act 2015 which categorises these acts as offences. These crimes include holding a person in a position of slavery, servitude forced or compulsory labour, or facilitating their travel with the intention of exploiting them soon after. There are several different types of exploitation that victims of modern slavery may be subject to, for example; sexual exploitation, criminal exploitation or forced labour. Section 52 of the Modern Slavery Act places a statutory duty on the Local Authority to identify and refer modern slavery victims to the Home Office. If the adult consents, this will be through the National Referral Mechanism (NRM). If the adult does not consent, there is still a duty to notify the Home Office using the MS1 form. The Care Act 2014 recognises modern slavery as a form of abuse and where there is reasonable cause to suspect an adult with care and support needs is a victim of modern slavery and unable to safeguard themselves, then further statutory safeguarding duties under s42 will apply. Where there is a serious risk of immediate harm, call police on 999.
